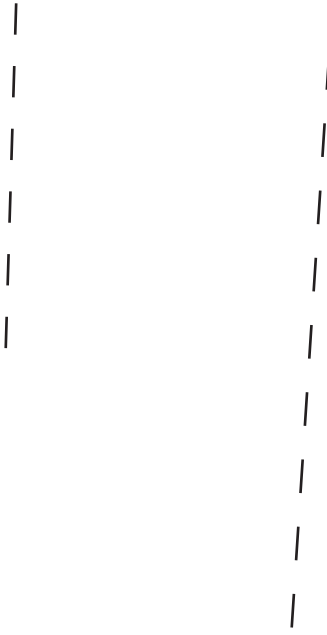


Harriet Tubman died in 1913 and was buried with military honors in Auburn, New York.

The Underground Railroad was different than other railroads because it had no big train cars or coal-burning engines. Instead, the Underground Railroad was made up of people that helped slaves secretly travel from the slave-holding American south to the emancipated north where they could be free.





In 1896 Ms. Harriet Tubman reflected on her years with the Underground Railroad, "I was the conductor of the Underground Railroad for eight years, and I can say what most conductors can't say — I never ran my train off the track and I never lost a passenger."
